**Matthew Erkoreka** is a Canadian composer who "writes with an honesty which enchant[s]" (Vancouver Sun). His music has performed across North America (Canada, USA), Europe (England, Sweden, Estonia, Russia, Republic, Austria), Asia and Oceania (China, New Zealand, South Korea) and has been heard on television and radio. Matthew is the recipient of the ACDA Raymond W. Brock prize (USA) and the Loomer award for Choral Writing (Canada), among many other awards from across

North America. He studied at the University of British Columbia and the University of Toronto. He is a member of the Canadian Music Centre, Canadian League of Composers and is composer-in-residence with the Amabile Choirs of Canada and the ORIANA Women's Choir in Toronto.



**Paul Laurence Dunbar** (June 27, 1872 – February 9, 1906) was an American poet, novelist, and playwright of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Born in Dayton, Ohio, to parents who had been enslaved in Kentucky before the American Civil War, Dunbar began to write stories and verse when still a child and was president of his high school's literary society. He published his first poems at the age of 16 in a Dayton newspaper.

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
