Her works have been performed across Canada by Babel Choir, Exultate Chamber Ensemble (Vancouver), Exultate Chamber Singers (Toronto), the Allegra Chamber Ensemble (Edmonton), the SHHH!! Ensemble (Ottawa), Edmonton Winds (Edmonton), Soprano Maghan McPhee, Daniel Dueck (Ottawa), Allen Stiles (Vancouver), Pro Coro Canada (Edmonton), and has mentored through the Tuckamore Widening the Circle Program (Newfoundland).

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Performances of her works were featured at Ottawa Chamberfest, Vancouver's Allegra Chamber Orchestra, Toronto's East Chamber Festival, the Banff Centre for the Arts, New Music Edmonton Summer Solstice, and the 2022 Choral Canada's Podium Conference as the recipient of the Stephen Chatman Student Choral Composition.
